<u>Supporting Document 10 - Survey of Community Facilities in Eye - March 2018 (Final)</u>

1. The purpose of the survey of community facilities was to identify how well they are used, what needs each has for improvements and to obtain views about how they might be marketed better individually and collectively.

The Facilities

2. Nine community facilities were identified as having space for meetings and events. One (the Town Hall), is owned by the Town Council, two (Abbey Hall and the Queens Head) are privately owned and the others are owned by community groups and charities.

(Note: Hartismere High School also has space to let – mainly for leisure facilities. They have not been included in the full survey but what they offer can be summarised as follows:

'Here at Hartismere we have Badminton Courts, Astro, Tennis and Netball Courts available for hire. As well as various inside spaces for functions.

We normally accommodate a regular Dance class three times a week, Martial Arts and Clubbercise once a week and during the winter months the Astro is busy most evenings, a long side these, we have regular Badminton users.

Our charges vary from £8.75 per hour for the Badminton to £32.00 per hour for a third of the Astro.')

Description of the Facilities

 Collectively the nine premises offer a wide range of facilities for a wide range of activities with the exception of the Volunteer Centre which is an office.

Lounge has the Moors Watering Hole Licenced Bar. 2 x Changing/Shower rooms (Showers currently inoperable).Ladies and mens toilets in 2 locations. Disabled toilet and baby changing. State of the Art projector in main hall.

Eye Town Hall	Main Hall on ground floor and Council Chamber on first floor. Ladies/Gents toilets (disabled toilet under construction), large kitchen. Tables and chairs available with hire.
Scout Hut	Small meeting room and large activity room. Ladies, disabled and gents toilets. Kitchen with hatch through to main hall. Store rooms. With the exception of the upstairs store room, all areas are fully accessible to all and comply with disability regulations. Off street parking for 8 vehicles of which 1 disabled bay. Large outdoor activity area. Selection of games equipment held.
Dove Hall	One Large Room and One smaller room. Medium sized kitchen facility (Caters for Seniors Luncheon Club and Little Doves Parents and Toddler Group, parties etc). Media facility available, ie internet access and large screen. Table Tennis table. Snooker could be made available.

4. The facilities also offer a wide range of seating and standing capacities.

Primary Users of each Facility

- 5. The facilities have some differences in terms of their core purpose and therefore whether they have a primary user:
- Abbey Hall is a commercial facility offering a venue for arts based activities, some weddings and group hire.

- The Community Centre is home to the Saints Football Club and the Eye Cinema but is used by a wide range of community groups and for private parties and weddings.
- The Town Council is the primary user of the Committee Room in the Town Hall but it is also used for weddings and other functions while the main hall is used for private functions and community activities such as the indoor Market.
- The Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies are the primary users of the Scout Hut, the Vine Church is the primary user of Dove Hall and the Bowls Club for the Bowls Club building during the Bowls season.
- Primary users of the Queens Head are those coming to eat and drink.
 The pub is also used for meetings for groups such as Eye Business
 Forum. The pub also hosts weddings, parties, musical events, etc which attract additional users.
- The Bank runs as a community arts centre open as a café (currently Weds-Sat) with classes throughout the week, evening and weekend events /performances and regular art exhibitions. New partnerships with other voluntary organisations are forming.
- 6. All are well used for their primary use except the Volunteer Centre which is only used two half days a week by a single worker.

7. All facilities are available for hire for a range of community and private functions and are hired out regularly. The exception is the Volunteer Centre which has offices for commercial use.

Promotion

- 9. There is a difference between Abbey Hall, the Queens Head, the Community Centre and the Town Hall, which are promoted through their own website and other social media and the other facilities that are promoted within the Town using the magazine and Eye to Eye and word of mouth. The Bank has its own website as well as using standard community avenues.
- 10. Respondents were asked for their views about how the facilities could be promoted more effectively:
- Currently a complete review is being taken out on how the Town Hall can best be managed and promoted. The difficulty is offering a 24/7 service with part-time workers and volunteers
- We have found in the past that some venues are expensive in comparison to what we charge so have been put off using. When we were without the Scout Hut during our rebuilt we ended up holding our meetings in Mellis and Yaxley village halls since much more affordable.
- It is always difficult to fix a date for events to ensure there is not a clash. The town website could be better managed. Eye-to-Eye is a good resource for promoting events and we often print flyers that are distributed around town.
- Advertise hire facilities and cost in the Eye Magazine.

Potential exists for better collaborative work especially around key events /dates so that
working together we can increase foot-fall in the Town. Opportunities need to be
offered to all parts of the community and identifying particular needs is important – and
could be done cooperatively
